## I. BASIC LODGE INFORMATION

### COUNCIL FORMATION

**Redwood Empire Council** is the local council of the Boy Scouts of America that serves youth in Mendocino, and Sonoma counties in California.



### GEOGRAPHICAL COVERAGE AREA

Originally: Sonoma, Mendocino, Humboldt and Del Norte Counties. Currently the coverage area includes Sonoma and Mendocino Counties and the LDS units in Lake County. (As of January 2012)

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## IMPORTANT EVENTS AND MILESTONES



The Sonoma Mendocino Area Council (#041) was founded in 1921 as the Petaluma Section (#041). In 1992 it merged with the Redwood Area Council (#044), to form the Redwood Empire Council. The Redwood Area Council started on June 11th, 1923 as the Redwood District Council and consisted of Del Norte, Humboldt, and Mendocino Counties. In 1928 Lake County joined in, but in 1932 Mendocino and Lake Counties were transferred to the Silverado Council and the name was changed to Redwood Area for the remaining Council. At the beginning of 2012 Redwood Empire Council split apart at the old Council boundaries. Sonoma and Mendocino Counties remained as Redwood Empire Council while Humboldt and Del Norte Counties were absorbed into Crater Lake Council (#491).



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## CAMP FORMATION

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### LONG-TERM CAMPS

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#### CAMP NAVARRO

Camp Masonite Navarro is located near Navarro in Mendocino County, California.

Camp Navarro began as a lumber camp of the Albion Lumber Company. A spur of the Fort Bragg and Southeastern Railroad from Albion to the mill at Wendling (now Navarro) and Christine (now Floodgate) ran through the camp and up Neefus Creek. There was a "Y" for turning engines around that is still vaguely visible in camp. A piece of rail and large chain are also some railroad remnants that are displayed in front of the dining hall. Lumbering and the railroad stopped in the 1920s but notches cut in redwoods for springboards can still be seen in the Mohawk campsite and outside of the staff shower area. Goosepens, circles of redwoods sprouted from the roots of cut trees, are throughout the camp. All but one of the portable buildings that were built on skids to be moved from camp to camp, have disappeared. The one that remains is used as a tool shed. Part of a water tank on skids can also be seen.

The camp was used as a Civilian Conservation Corps camp during the Depression, and as an army camp at the start of World War II. When acquired by Scouting it still had a row of decrepit plywood barracks along

the river side of the parade ground. The lumber camp buildings on skids were used as Scout camp staff quarters for a number of years.

When Camp Navarro opened in 1956 the Adirondack shelters were built. Many of these same structures remain today. The current craft lodge is all that remains of the original dining hall. The foundation of a metal flagpole is still visible where the "55 Navarro Salute" cannon once stood. A wood-frame dam was erected on the North Fork of the Navarro River each summer to create a swimming area; in 1965 it gave way and the practice of building a gravel dam began. The gravel dam has not been built since 2001, however.



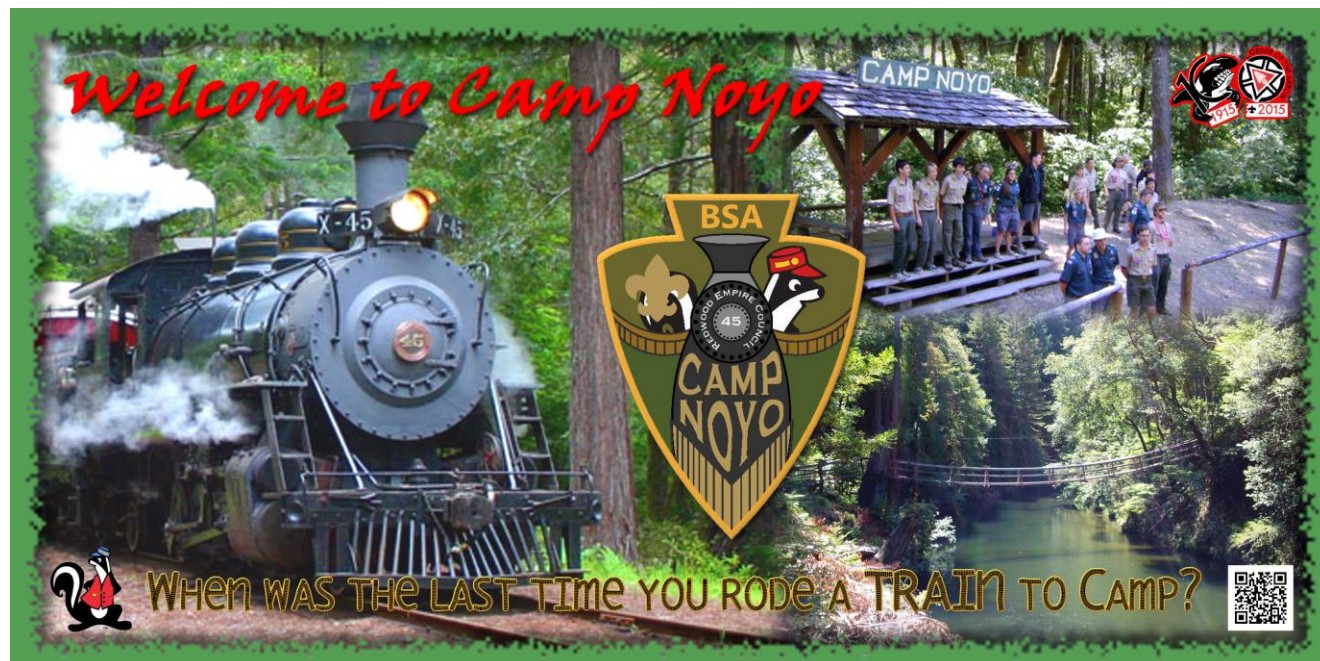
**Camp Navarro Staff – mid-1960's**

In late 1955, the land became the property of The Masonite Corporation. For 17 years, Masonite leased the camp to the Sonoma-Mendocino Area Council BSA for one dollar per year. Masonite sold Camp Navarro to the Sonoma-Mendocino Area Council on August 29, 1973 for one dollar, and it was renamed Camp Masonite Navarro. In 1993 the Redwood Area Council and Sonoma-Mendocino Council merged to form the current Redwood Empire Council. For many years, the camp hosted a summer program for Cub Scouts that lasted four days. It also held two annual sessions of Family Camp, Webelos Woods, and occasionally hosted other Scouting events such as Woodbadge and BSA National Camp School.

On April 18, 2012 it was announced that the Redwood Empire Council had sold Camp Masonite Navarro to Northwest Stewards LLC. The property was sold for \$1.9 million. The terms of the agreement allow the council to continue to use the property for scout-related activities. Since 2001 environmental regulations prevented the damming of the North Fork of the Navarro River. Without a waterfront the camp was unable to attract scouts to fill enough summer camp sessions to keep the camp solvent. As a result the camp became a financial burden that caused the council to run a deficit and go into debt. The proceeds from the sale will retire all of the council's outstanding debt, and will fund a three-year outreach program and a long-term endowment to support the council's future efforts.

Since that time, the camp has been renamed to Camp Navarro





Camp Noyo was first developed as a logging camp for the Union Lumber Company in 1907. Originally called “Camp Four,” it was the fourth camp established by the lumber company as they progressed east from Fort Bragg along the current route of the California Western Railroad. In 1933, the Union Lumber Company donated the property to the Boy Scouts of America. The Boy Scouts began using the site in the summer 1934 and continue to use the property for several weeks every summer.

In 2012, Allan Hemphill, his son Brian, and a small group of family friends purchased the property from the Boy Scouts. The Hemphill family has been caretaking Camp Noyo for over 60 years.

Now under new ownership, Camp Noyo has been made available to the general public on a very limited basis. This unique property has eight private campsites and one River View Chalet, flush toilet, wood-heated showers, and the use of canoes, kayaks, and row boats. The seasonal summer dam creates an estuary that allows boat access to a mile of the river upstream of the camp. The Noyo River is crystal clear and cold and has several very deep pools that are home to rainbow trout, steelhead, salmon, river otters, ducks, salamanders, and frogs. One can enjoy a brisk swim or just nap under the afternoon sun and on the floating dock anchored in the middle of the river.

Interested parties are encouraged to book their reservation early for this truly unique opportunity.





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## CAMP RIGGS JOHNSTON



This former logging camp has served as a Scout camp since 1952.

Camp Riggs Johnston was formerly a logging camp belonging to the Carson Lumber Company. Originally a large lumber camp complete with rail facilities including an engine house and water tower, there is presently little remaining. The present dining hall and kitchen were part of the original facility.

Through the years there were a number of owners ending with the present owner, Humboldt Redwood Company. The camp has been leased to the Scouts since 1952. At that time it was known as Elk River Scout Camp

In July 2004, this camp was renamed to honor long time scouter Riggs Johnston. The former "Elk River Scout Camp" is located on the North Fork of the Elk River in Northern California, nestled in the redwoods near Eureka, CA.

- Originally a logging camp equipped with rail facilities
- Some of these relics remain, including the dining hall and kitchen
- No potable water on site – bring bottled water for drinking, teeth brushing, cooking
- There is running water for general washing, but no shower facility

When Redwood Empire Council was reorganized in 2012, this camp property was transferred to Crater Lake Council.

Also, another tidbit I found 'In 1927 in addition to operating Camp Hine, a second camp on the Noyo River ran for two sessions' (quote worded from memory, but the details are correct). I assumed this was Camp Noyo, but reading the Noyo history in this document, I'm not sure. This camp on the Noyo was not used again by RDC/RAC between 1928 and 1932 when Mendocino changed Councils. 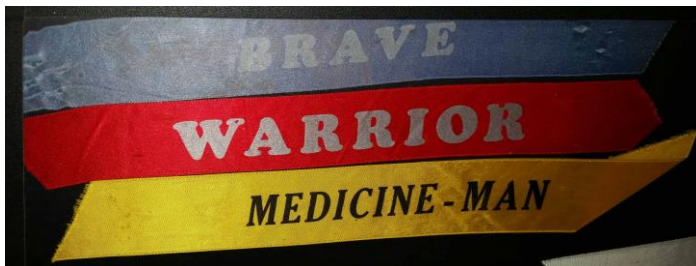
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### TRIBE OF NOYO

Prior to 1938, the Sonoma-Mendocino Area Council was part of the Silverado Area Council with headquarters located in Vallejo. Our present Camp Noyo was the long term camping area for the Silverado Area Council, thus the name "Camp Silverado" is found on the Station and the NWPRR train schedule of that era. Camp Noyo is located about half way between Willits and Fort Bragg, a distance of 36 miles and the only access was by NWP train which ran from either town. Camp Noyo was the Council Camp from 1938 until 1958, at which point Camp Navarro came into existence.

During its heyday, Camp Noyo had its own Tribe of Noyo. When a Scout first attended camp, he was known as a "Neophyte." A formal induction ceremony was conducted at each Sunday evening campfire, and involved such ceremonial figures as the Supreme Chief, the Camp Chief, the Medicine Man, one dancer, and a drummer. In addition, all Scouts who had earned a merit badge or completed a rank advancement, were elevated to the status of "Brave." Subsequently, second year braves were accorded the position of "Warrior," third year campers who served on the Camp Staff, could in time become "Medicine Men" and "Chiefs." In many instances, the latter honor required some 5 to 6 years of participation in the program offered at Camp Noyo. Each ceremony was conducted at a different site, taking most/all of a given Friday evening.

With the change from Camp Noyo to Camp Navarro, the last meeting of the Tribe of Noyo took place in 1956.



## LODGE FOUNDING

In 1992, the Redwood Empire Council was formed from a merger of the Redwood Area Council and the Sonoma Mendocino Area Council. Upon completion of the merger of the two councils the new Scout Executive appointed a new lodge adviser (both current lodge advisers had stepped down prior to the merger) and tasked the new leadership with forming one new lodge. Cabrosha Lodge and Mow-A-Toc had long and storied pasts, being very active in Section W3B and other OA activities. In 1993 Lodge 537 was chartered with "No Lodge Name" and during the transition period, lodge flaps were issued that included the totems of both legacy lodges (complying with the "one lodge per council" rule but honoring the transition was still taking place). The new territory spanned an 8 hour drive border to border and several meetings were held throughout the 4 county geographic area. Hundreds of hours were spent planning and organizing the merger, structure and even new by-laws with the final planning session being held at Camp Masonite Navarro, in the California Redwoods, starting a tradition of lodge fellowship weekends and bring the youth together to learn that the lodge becomes stronger when the bonds of brotherhood are shared. Two intense years of planning and organizing finally came to a close with the formation of Orca Lodge 194. Orca Lodge held its first Lodge Dinner on January 6, 1994. It is only fitting that 194 was granted as the Lodge's number, as it symbolizes the date (1/94) of the founding of the Lodge. The totem of the Lodge is that of the Killer whale, or Orca.



## COUNCIL REORGANIZATION

In January of 2012, we were informed that effective immediately, Redwood Empire Council was being reorganized. The former Sonoma-Mendocino Area Council would continue as Redwood Empire Council, while the area of the former Redwood Area Council (Humboldt and Del Norte counties) would transfer to Crater Lake Council. There had been speculation for a few months about this change, but the speed at which it happened caught the Lodge off guard.

We decided to continue with our planned Lodge Leader Development weekend scheduled for the following week in Arcata, CA. It was very important to get as many of the members from the Cabrosha Chapter to this event as possible. At the time of the split, all of the Lodge Officers were members of the Mow-A-Toc Chapter, and would no longer be a part of Orca.

Representatives from Lo La'Qam Geela Lodge joined us for the training and fellowship that rainy weekend. At the end of the weekend, we held our final LEC meeting with Mow-A-Toc Chapter in attendance. The officers of Cabrosha chapter were voted into their respective Orca Lodge positions by this outgoing LEC. The Orca officers that were transferring to Lo La'Qam Geela Lodge were able to join their new Lodge with the positions that they had been elected to (with minor modifications on the Chief role). All Mow-A-Toc members in attendance that weekend were also presented with their new Lodge flap.



### CABROSHA LODGE



Cabrosha Lodge #537, was first chartered October 1, 1959, during what is generally thought of as the dawning of the Golden Era of Scouting. The lodge can actually trace its roots to 1956, when Harold J. Alexander became the Council Executive of the Sonoma-Mendocino Area Council, bringing with him the concept of the Order. That same summer marked the last meeting of the Tribe of Noyo, and thus the birth of the Order of the Arrow in our area. In the fall of 1957, the infant lodge met for the first time, with such long time Scouters as then District Executive Sam Withrow and Harold Yoder in attendance as well as Mr. Alexander. The first Ordeal took place with the aid of Mow-A-Toc Lodge #262 from Eureka. Key leadership in the lodge leaned heavily upon Dick Livingston from the Yokayo District in Ukiah and Pop Bond of the Miwok district in Petaluma. In addition, Sam Withrow (knew a great deal about Plains Indian dances and regalia); Hume Bunyan (one of the scouting dads--very supportive and helpful); Steve Yaeger (another very supportive dad; he and Hume accompanied the Scouts to the 1957 Jamboree); Bill Soderquist (active adult leader at camp Navarro); and Alexei Sokolovski (Alex Sokol, father of Nicolai "Nick" Sokol, and very helpful transporting kids to camp and events).

Mike Moratto one the charter members of the lodge and an early Lodge Chief spoke of lots of workshops where the lodge made authentic costumes and practiced Indian dances. Several of our lodge members--Bob Race, Larry Knight, Bob Nichols, a few others (whose names escape) and I became rather accomplished dancers and began to compete, initially with other California OA lodges. Under Sam Withrow's guidance, we formed the **Nawaka Indian Dancers** and began performing at local events. The lodge was well known throughout the Sonoma Mendocino area for their performances.

Sometime in 1964 Jerry Barndt became a member of the lodge while serving as Program Director for Camp Navarro. Jerry would go on to become Lodge Adviser in 1969, throughout the 70s and into '80's with the assistance of Martin M Webb.

From 1958 – 1965, the Cabrosha Lodge flap depicted a Seal on a Rock. In 1965, the patch was changed to reflect the North Coast Indians' rendition of the face of a Seal.

In the spring of 1967 the first Vigil Members of Cabrosha Lodge were inducted at Lake Mendocino, once again with the aid of Mow-A-Toc Lodge. The first Vigils were Hume Buyan, Dick Hacke, Doug McDonald, Chester Dunning and Dick Livingston.

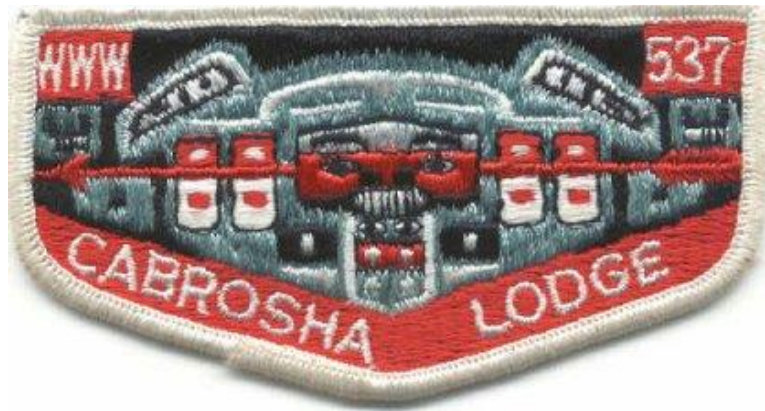
In the summer of 1967 Cabrosha Lodge hosted its first Area 12C Conclave at the Ukiah Municipal Park. It should be noted, that at this time, lodges bid to host conclaves and the other lodges voted for what was perceived to be the best choice. Unique to this event was all meals were taken at local restaurants in Ukiah, away from the conclave site. The conclave Chief was Doug McDonald with Dennis Mowbray serving as Vice Chief. The Cabrosha Lodge Chief that year was Marty Webb.

In the summer of 1969 at the close of Summer Season at Camp Navarro, Jerry Barndt and several other members of the Lodge went on a Road Trip. Their journey found them attending the 1969 NOAC at Indiana University. Thus they became the first delegates of Cabrosha Lodge to attend a National Conference. Among those making the trek were Jerry Barndt, Alan Meyer, Dennis Mowbray, Jim Panttaja and Marty Webb.



This road trip adventure was repeated in 1971 with the merry band traveling to the University of Norte Dame where the National Order of the Arrow Conclave was taking place. Among those making the trek this time were Jerry Barndt, Gordon Robertson, Dennis Mowbray and Marty Webb.

But they had to hurry back, as Cabrosha Lodge had once again been selected to host the 1971 Area 12C Conclave at Camp Navarro. The Chief was Gordon Robertson, with Jim Panttaja as Secretary and Keller McDonald as Treasurer. With over 500 members journeying to Navarro, the conclave was a huge success.



It was during the late 60's and early 70's that Cabrosha Lodge emerged as a political force in Area and eventually Section politics. A relatively small lodge in comparison to other lodges at this time, Cabrosha actively led the way in lobbying for rule changes and who would be successful in their bid to host conclaves. To this day, Martin Webb is immortalized as the "White man who speaks with Forked Tongue" for his performance at an area planning meeting held in Yuba City.

In 1972 the lodge was moved for a time to Area 12B, which was basically all the lodges surrounding the San Francisco Bay. The lodge was not pleased and fought the move. Area meetings were attended and the lodge lobbied heavily to be returned to Area 12C. Letters were written, phone calls made, much coffee was drunk. Cabrosha remained faithful in attending all Area meetings and was as much a pain in the neck as possible, by citing all infractions of Roberts Rules of Order, belaboring points, and otherwise dragging out meetings. It worked. In less than a year's time Cabrosha was back in Area 12C.

But only for a short time, as starting in 1973, the BSA had decided to change to larger regions. Cabrosha fell into the Western Region, Section 3B. In 1972 the last 12C conclave took place at Beale Air Force Base. The ever political Cabrosha was not planning to bid for the 1973 conclave, but did join forces with several other lodges to thwart Mayi Lodge who placed a strong bid to be the first host lodge of the new section. Cabrosha was successful in getting Mow-A-Toc Lodge selected as the first W-3B host. This was the end of the conclave bidding process and forward hence, a rotation was created with each lodge in succession taking turns hosting.

In 1973 the only NOAC ever held west of the Rockies took place at University of California Santa Barbara. The lodge sent a large contingent via automobile and had a great time. From here on out, to the best of my knowledge, the lodge always sent at least two members to NOAC. It should be noted that during this time the lodge had continued to grow and at one point had over 400 members. Bruce Mayfield and Bob Lake both recall an Ordeal in 1969 wherein over 100 ordeal candidates were inducted (it took two shifts to cram them all in the ceremony site). Bob Lake served as Lodge chief in 1972 and was followed by Bruce Mayfield who started a tradition that would last for the next 10 years of back to back terms as Lodge Chief in 1973 and 1974. Not to be out done, Dave Gilmore repeated the back to back thing in 1975 and 1976, then Bob Luttrell in 1977-1978, Dave Cooper in 1979-1980 and Ray Leonard in 1981-1982.

In 1974 the Lodge took on Leadership of a Council wide event, the Harold J. Alexander Jamboree. It was held on October 25, 26, and 27, 1974 at Two Rock Coast Guard Training Center. The event was to honor Mr. Alexander at the time of his retirement as Executive of the Sonoma-Mendocino Area Council. One memory etched in my mind is that of Mr. Alexander standing in the back of Jerry Barndt's Jeep waving to the over 500 scouts lining the road as he slowly motored out of the Jamboree.

Conclaves, ordeal, fellowships, even NOACs came in swift succession. In 1979 it was finally Cabrosha's turn to serve as host for a W-3B Conclave. Held at Camp Masonite Navarro, once again over 500 Arrowmen made the journey. Many will never forget the band hired by Bob Luttrell to play the Saturday night theme show. "Lips" generated their own aura that was almost smokier than the campfires cheerfully burning around them. Dave Cooper was Lodge chief that year and was key to convincing Kitty Tipitts to serve as the first Conclave booklet centerfold.

Year 1979 also saw the lodge send a contingent to NOAC in Fort Collins, CO, via train. A grand adventure was had by all, including a wildcat union strike that found the lodge aiding passengers in unloading baggage and getting all on buses to continue the journey. Arriving 12 hours late, and having stood in the aisle of a bus for 5 hours, we finally made it to NOAC. On the way back, the trains once again were running. The contingent made the acquaintance of John Madden, recently retired Oakland Raiders Coach. We played cards with him and talked through the night. Dave Cooper even has an autographed sash signed by Mr. Madden.

Mow-A-Toc Lodge 262 of the Redwood Area Council was first chartered May 27, 1944, but the first members did not go through their Ordeal until 1948 when members of the Machek N'Gult Lodge #375 out of Oakland came up to officiate. Located at Camp Tish-Tang, candidates canoed across the Trinity River to their ceremony site on the banks of where Tish-Tang-A-Lang Creek flows into the Trinity. In 1950 members of 375 returned to Tish-Tang to perform the first Brotherhood Ceremony. In 1954 Mow-A-Toc's first Vigil member was Levi Young, one of the original members, who's Vigil was kept at that year's Conclave in Stockton. The first Vigil to be conducted in the Mow-A-Toc boundaries was for Jerry Hasz in 1956 at Blue Creek, up the Klamath River near the Humboldt-Del Norte County line.

In 1954 Mow-A-Toc hosted its first Conclave at Elk River Scout Camp. The highlight of the event was Saturday night's dinner consisting of a massive crab feed. In 1957 Conclave was again hosted by Mow-A-Toc, this time at Camp Tish-Tang. Participants witnessed especially lively dance competitions and a native village was on display because of the camp's location on a reservation.

The origin of the name Mow-A-Toc is somewhat fuzzy. Early white settlers of the region had spellings of what is now called the Modoc Tribe that varied greatly. Looking at these historic spellings, Mow-A-Toc and Modoc could easily be the same word interpreted into the English alphabet differently. Another possibility is that the Mowatoc people were the Southwest portion of the Modoc Tribe. They had similar names because they were associated, but the minor difference distinguished them. There are also references that Mow-A-Toc translates to Feather of the Forest, though I could not find any additional information on that, like in which language. This translation is fitting for the Lodge's totem, the Redwood Tree, because the Redwood's needles look like feathers.

The first was believed to be in the 1970's, but many years before women were officially allowed into the Order. We have not been able to find the record of this. The 1991 date would correspond to the earliest that a woman could achieve Vigil after the female adviser ban was lifted in 1988.

<sup>2</sup> These were recorded in the National Vigil records after Mow-A-Toc was no longer a Lodge. It appears that these had been added to correct missing entries, but we don't have correct dates on these.

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### LODGE “LEAVE NO TRACE” PROJECT

BSA expanded the Outdoors Ethics program and asked Councils to provide increased emphasis in this area as too many scout units were not practicing sound environmental stewardship. Orca Lodge recognized that one of the purposes of the Order of the Arrow was to: **“Promote camping, responsible outdoor adventure, and environmental stewardship as essential components of every Scout’s experience, in the unit, year-round, and in summer camp.”** In addition, one of the primary elements of the Messengers of Peace program is: **“Relationships between humankind and its environment”**. Orca Lodge decided to become Messengers of peace by providing Outdoor Ethics Awareness to the units of the redwood Empire Council.

These costs were donated saving the Lodge over \$500.00. Once the Lodge members were trained they signed up for all of the scheduled Council activities that included; Cub Scout Twilight camp, Webelos Woods, District Camporee, University of Scouting, Advance Camp, Hornaday weekend. Orca Lodge volunteered to conduct the Outdoor Ethics training at the Order of the Arrow Section Conclave. In addition, they members went to a number of individual Pack and Troop meetings.

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## LODGE ANNIVERSARY OBSERVATIONS

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### 10<sup>TH</sup> 2004

The 2003 Lodge Dinner took place at the Luther Burbank Arts and Garden Center, in Santa Rosa. There were a hundred and eight people in attendance. Seventy four members and thirty four non-members. The catered food was not only plentiful, but of excellent quality. During the course of the evening Logo jackets, polo shirts, sweat shirts and more were awarded to lucky ticket holders. There was even a fund raising auction. As this was the 10th Anniversary of the founding of Orca Lodge, a special lodge flap was issued and members could purchase up to three for \$5.00 each. A special effort was made to get all the Lodge Chiefs from the past in attendance. Lane Kasselmann/1994, Tom Rathbun/1997, Jason Yarnall/1999, and Michael Buxton/2001 & 2002 were able to attend and showed the *Spirit of the Arrow* and *Leadership to the Lodge* still live on, even many years later. Traveling from Reno to join in on the festivities were Ross Armstrong, Section W3B Chief as well as Steve Davidek and Everett Holm, W3B Adviser and Associate Adviser.

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### 20<sup>TH</sup> 2014

Starting in late 2013, Orca Lodge was discussing our goals for our 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary year. First, we wanted to continue to be recognized as a Journey to Excellence – Gold lodge. Next we wanted to continue to grow, both in our presence in the Council, and at the Section level. One of the big ways that we accomplished this was to take on the ownership of the Leave No Trace – Outdoor Ethics program for the Council. We trained several of our youth to be LNT trainers and made ourselves available to the Units in the Council, and to the Section Conclave. In addition, we began our site selection process for hosting the 2015 W-3N Centennial Conclave. Several sites were investigated, but ultimately Sonoma Raceway was chosen. In cooperation with the Raceway, we will be able to host our Conclave alongside of the Indy Car Series finale race weekend in 2015.

At the end of the year we held our Lodge Dinner with a packed house at the Presbyterian Church of the Roses. Our year was complete with the continuation of our status of JTE Gold.

## CAMP SERVICE PROJECTS

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### BUILDING SHOWERHOUSE AT CAMP RIGGS

One service project that Orca Lodge was heavily involved in was the building of the Showerhouse at Camp Riggs Johnston. The Lodge helped finance this thru the Orca Shower Chenille, & the OA Service grant. Many hours were spent on the labor of this project by the members of the Lodge, especially those in Mow-A-Toc Chapter. Currently work is being done on creating an improved water system at Camp Riggs, which will make this showerhouse more available to the users of the camp.

## IV. LODGE ACHIEVEMENT AND AWARDS

### E. URNER GOODMAN CAMPING AWARD

The E. Urner Goodman Award was established in 1969 as a tribute and testimonial to the Order's founder, E. Urner Goodman. Its purpose is to encourage and challenge Order of the Arrow members and lodges to increase their effectiveness in promoting and increasing Scout camping in each council. Awards are presented to two outstanding lodges in each region annually.

### NATIONAL SERVICE AWARDS

The National Service Award was established in 1999 to recognize lodges in each region that have performed outstanding service, both in a qualitative and a quantitative sense, to their council. The National Service Award Petition is submitted along with the lodge recharter application. To be considered for the National Service Award, a lodge must be certified as a National Quality Lodge the year in which the National Service Award Petition is submitted. Two lodges per region will be granted the National Service Award each year.

The National Service Award petition requires lodges to submit information on current lodge membership (the size of a lodge is a factor when considering the magnitude of the service it has provided), a detailed description of the largest and most meaningful service project the lodge has completed for its council, and a record of all service performed by the lodge for the council since the last recharter process. Service for this award is defined as any project that has directly benefited the Scouting program in the council.

### NATIONAL OA SERVICE GRANTS

One of the four fold purposes of the Order of the Arrow is "to crystallize the Scout habit of helpfulness into a life purpose of leadership in cheerful service to others." It is with this spirit of cheerful service to others that the Order proudly offers the matching service grant program.

For several years, the National Order of the Arrow Committee has provided matching service award grants for a limited number of projects submitted by application to the national office. Respective council offices receive letter notification from the national office when they are awarded the grant.

Matching grant money is given to lodges for camp or service center projects in their local council. The Order will provide up to one-half of the money for a service project, with a \$5,000 maximum amount granted for any lodge project.

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#### 2006 - CAMP RIGGS "GRANTED" IT'S WISH.

Following the National Planning Meeting which was held in Dallas, TX in December 2015, Orca Lodge received notification that we were chosen out of 59+ requests to receive a Grant from the Order of the Arrow. We were granted \$3,150. Although we didn't gain the full (requested) amount we were looking for, we still appreciate the generosity. This is a great honor to our lodge. Only 10 Lodges every year receive a service grant. This money was used for the construction of a new shower house at Camp Riggs Johnson. This proves that wishes do come true. We supplemented this grant with the sale of the "Orca in the Shower" chenille (C6).

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## 2015 - MORE SERVICE TO CAMP RIGGS

The Crater Lake Council, Lo La'Qam Geela Lodge (where our former Mow-A-Toc chapter was transferred to), headquartered in Central Point, Oregon, received \$3,300 to provide a portable water filtration and distribution system at Camp Riggs. This will continue the service grant awarded in 2006 for the Showerhouse, and will help to allow the showers to be used by a larger group of campers than was formerly allowed, and to bring potable water into the kitchen.

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## 2016 – REDWOOD EMPIRE COUNCIL MAKERLAB

At the December 2015 National Planning meeting, it was announced that Orca Lodge will be the recipient of an Order of the Arrow Service Grant in the amount of \$2,100 to support the Council in the development of a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) based MakerLab. The Council is working hard to start this program in the office space across the hall from the Council Service Center. Orca Lodge is planning to contribute to this program by helping to purchase a 3D printer and this service grant will help to achieve this goal. To supplement the grant, the Lodge will be running fundraising to which will be determined by the incoming LEC. This is a great final recognition for Orca Lodge in the Order's Centennial year. 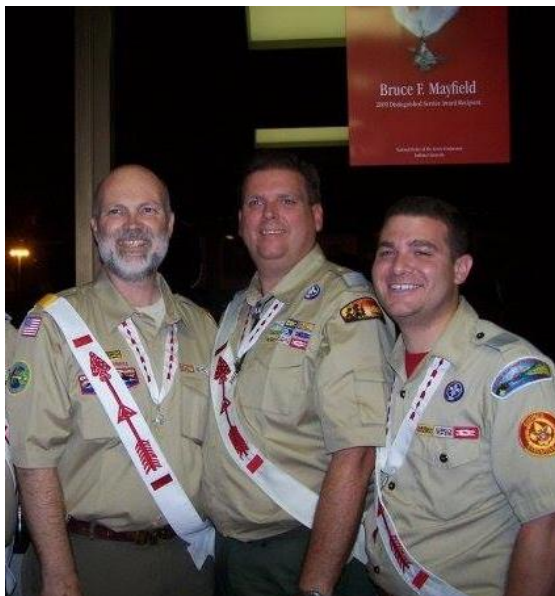

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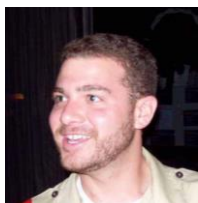
### BRUCE MAYFIELD

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#### JAMES E. WEST FELLOWSHIP

The James West Fellowship Award is probably the one award that sparks the most misunderstanding when spotted on a uniform. Some folks immediately assume that the award was simply purchased, which is not accurate. This award is presented to individuals based on a contribution of \$1000 or more to the local Council's West Fellowship Fund (endowment). Only registered Scouters or youth members receive and wear the square knot.

The money may be given by a group of Scouters or individual Scouter to honor a fellow Scouter, as a memorial on the death of a Scouter, or to recognize an achievement. For example, a group of Scouters could put the money together to recognize the outstanding efforts of an individual who spent years doing publicity work for a local Council through newsletters, press releases, web pages, etc., for which there is no official recognition. The award can also be given to an individual who makes a contribution on his/her own behalf.

The Orca Lodge LEC presents this award each year as part of our support of the Redwood Empire Council, and to further recognize members of the Lodge for their service.

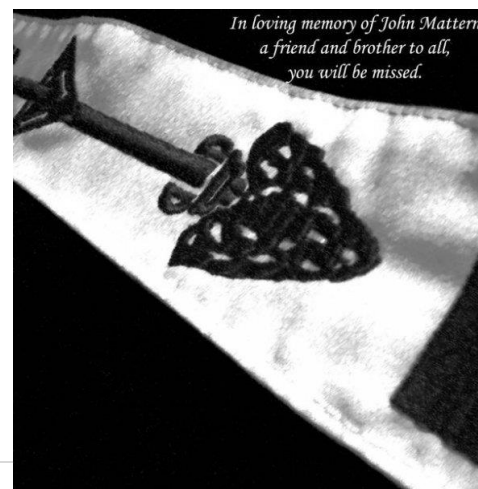

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#### JOHN MATTERN MEMORIAL HIGH ADVENTURE CAMPERSHIP

In memory of 2005 Section W-3B Chief John Mattern, the Council of Chiefs has created a High Adventure Campership for Arrowmen from our Section to help defray the costs of attending one of the National Order of the Arrow High Adventure programs at Philmont Scout Ranch, Northern Tier, or the Florida High Adventure Sea Base. Section W-3N and its leadership find it so imperative to not only support these programs but to also offer financial assistance to the Arrowmen of the Amangi Nacha, Orca, Talako, Tannu, and Ut-In Sélica lodges to help pay for the program costs.

Although it is not a requirement to be an active member in the order of the Arrow to participate in any of the OA High Adventure Programs, the Section High Adventure Campership is reserved for those individuals who exhibit interest and service as well as a future commitment to the Order of the Arrow in their home lodges. It is expected of the recipients to continue their service in the OA as well as bring the enthusiasm gained from these programs back to their home councils, lodges, chapters, and units. Recipients will be required at the end of their experience to provide the Section with an account of their experiences that can be posted on the Section website for recognition and promotion for the programs and the Campership.

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#### E. URNER GOODMAN SCHOLARSHIP

The purpose of the E. Urner Goodman Scholarship program was to assist members of the Order of the Arrow who are preparing for a professional Scouting career. Grants were provided to help fulfill the financial obligations of their college education.

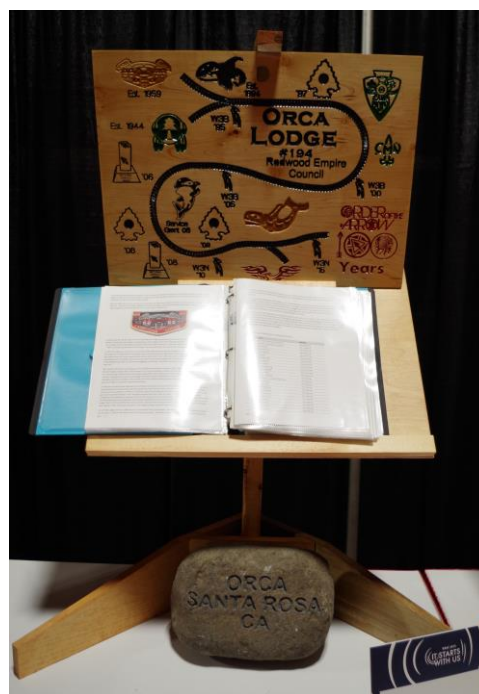
The National Order of the Arrow committee established the scholarship fund as a meaningful living memorial to the founder of the Order and to help perpetuate recruitment of high-caliber, service-minded individuals dedicated to professional Scouting service. This Scholarship was discontinued after 2004.

E. Urner Goodman, founder of the Order of the Arrow, was a teacher before entering the professional service of the Boy Scouts of America in 1915. He retired as national director of Program in 1951. Dr. Goodman believed strongly that a professional career in Scouting provided an excellent method of serving one's fellow man.

For the 1984-85 year, Ray Leonard was awarded this Scholarship (National OA Bulletin, Fall 1984). *"Leonard, from Petaluma, California, is a Vigil Honor member of Cabrosha Lodge 537. An Eagle Scout with a Silver Palm, he has served as senior patrol leader and Explorer post president, and is an assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 8 in the Sonoma Mendocino Council. Leonard, a student at Sonoma State University, was a member of the 1983 National OA Conference Committee and has served the OA as a chapter chief, lodge chief, and section chief."* Ray was again presented this Scholarship in 1985

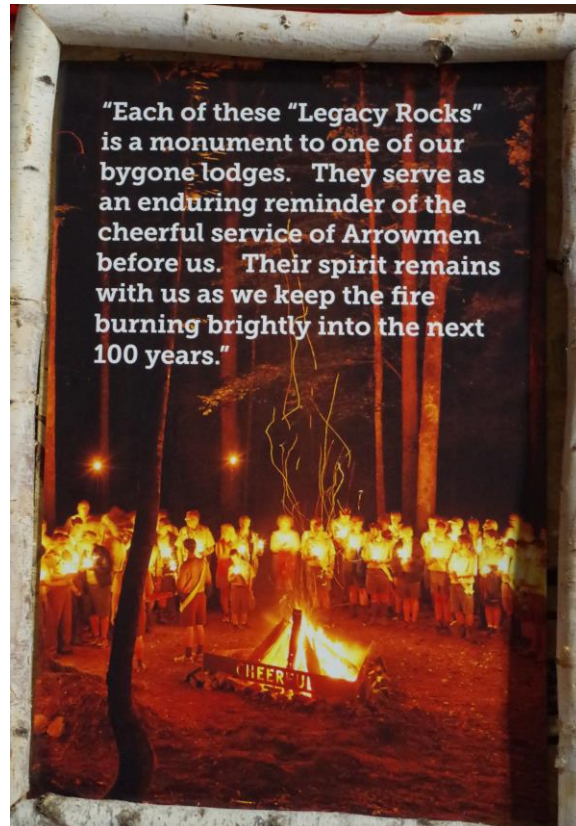

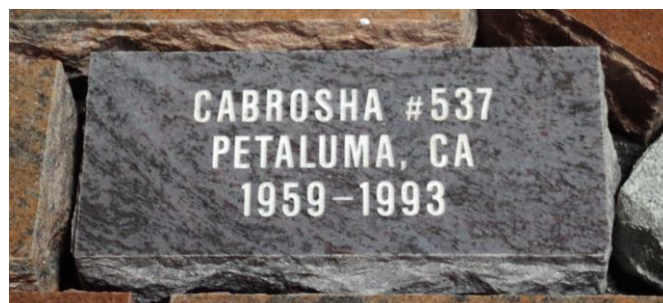

## LEGACY LID

Orca Lodge has submitted our Legacy Lid in honor of the Order of the Arrow Centennial.

*The next step is to ponder the legacy your lodge has left in the Order's first 100 years serving your council and the legacy your lodge wants to make in a new century of service. At last year's NOAC, each lodge was given a Centennial crate to assist lodges in celebrating the 100th anniversary of the OA. Your lodge's charge is to take the lid to this crate and paint it on one side to reflect your lodge's legacy. Consider incorporating the design for your 100th anniversary NOAC 2015 contingent flap into the lid design.*

**From the Legacy Project instructions**

The story told by our lid is described below

This meandering timeline along the train tracks (which flow through Camp Noyo) shows important milestones of Orca Lodge. The original charter dates of our two legacy lodges, Cabrosha & Mow-A-Toc, are followed by the forming of Orca Lodge in January 1994. Each Section Conclave that we have hosted is marked by feather coups. In 2012, we saw a split in our timeline with the Mow-A-Toc chapter being reassigned to Lo La'Qam Geela Lodge.

Major national recognitions have been shown with E. Urner Goodman Camping Awards, National Service Awards, and a National Service Grant. The three camps that Orca Lodge has served are represented as well: Camp Noyo, Camp Masonite Navarro (CMN), and Camp Riggs Johnston - Elk River Scout Camp (OA Service Grant).

After NOAC 2015, this will be displayed at the Council Office.

For nearly 100 years, the Order of the Arrow has purposefully recognized Scouts and Scouters who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives. Therefore, our organization's centennial provides a unique opportunity to commemorate those among us who are exemplars of the "high ideals and purpose of the Order of the Arrow." The Centurion Award aims to highlight "Hometown Heroes," or Arrowmen who have meaningfully contributed to the forming, maturing and ongoing operational excellence of their local council's lodge, and who, in doing so, inspired others to follow in their footsteps.

This award is a one-time recognition associated with the centennial anniversary of the OA that is bestowed by the national Order of the Arrow committee. It is modeled after a similar program in the BSA's 100th anniversary celebration, the 2010 National Hall of Leadership. Accordingly, this recognition is an opportunity to highlight lodge

development over the last century and the many individuals, both youth and adult, who were instrumental to this success. These honorees will serve as exemplars of leadership, modeling to others a commitment to cheerful service as the Order of the Arrow enters its second century.

This once in a lifetime recognition is to honor members of the Lodge (current and former) who have helped shape the legacy of the Lodge. Our Lodge decided to petition the National OA Committee to honor 8 individuals, covering the history and geography of Orca Lodge. Nominations had to be separated for Youth and Adult service, with no more than half being given for Adult service. Since Orca Lodge has a great history stretching into our Legacy Lodges (Cabrosha and Mow-A-Toc), some of our nominations were for service to those Legacy Lodges

DAVID DUKEMAN – FOR ADULT SERVICE TO ORCA LODGE



Dave first became an Arrowmen in the Los Angeles area where he received the Vigil honor. When he moved to Eureka with his family to manage the College of the Redwoods Bookstore it was only natural he became a part of Scouting and the Order of the Arrow on the North Coast.

Dave cares! He really cares about the Chapter, the Lodge, the Section, the Region, National and anything BSA. And most of all, he cares about the individual Arrowmen....even when they don't realize it or care themselves. It's in his blood. Don't ever try to come between anything Dave cares about. He is never afraid to speak out if he sees a better way or something is amiss. He is legendary in making his point via late night conversations that often lasted several hours...or more.

In 2002, Dave finally became the Orca Lodge Adviser. The only surprise of Dave becoming Adviser, was that it took so long. From the beginning when he participated in the formation of the merged Lodges, he had served as the right, the left and at times the head of the lodge already. Dave was to set a model on how to lead a lodge. He always seemed to be everywhere, never missing events. The lodge always seemed to find a way to achieve Quality Lodge status and churned out year after year of Section Leadership in youth as well as adults. Dave's legacy was and is his Boys'. Any of the youth who served as Lodge Chief, or for that matter any officer in the Lodge became loyal to Dave, willing to run through flaming hoops for anything the Lodge or the Order needed. Many times a young man showed up at a Lodge or Section function and delivered a great candidates speech. At first there was shock, as that youth who hadn't been able to order a pizza, was now an accomplished speaker. As the years rolled by it came to be expected that when a youth delivered a great speech, he must have been working with the speech doctor. That is, Dr. Dave.

During this time Dave was also instrumental in serving as the Section W-3B Trading Post Adviser, whereby he turned a sleepy little operation into a money making venue with a broad variety of products available for sale. He recruited and trained a capable team of youth and adults and greatly expanded what a trading post was and could be.

In 2008 when Dave was all but forced to retire, he didn't want to..."I'm not ready yet" he stated over and over. There is so much more to do! And in fact Dave has continued in his "retirement" to mentor and produce upcoming generations of youth in the OA.

Perhaps his crowning achievement to date is his son Matt Dukeman, but that's a whole other story!





By 1996 Matt emerged as only the 3rd Lodge Chief of Orca Lodge. The then young lodge was still experiencing many growing pains. Everything from calendar issues to which chapter should hold the Lodge Dinner and more. Matt took charge and was not afraid to stand up for what the youth wanted to his advisers. Often the adults thought he was wrong, but in almost every instance, in the long run he would be proved right.

Matt's ability to lead and do what he believed to be right and just is due in no small part to his experience at Philmont on OA Trail Crew. When Matt showed up at Philmont the first time, he was a bit young at just 15-1/2 (Age requirement was 16). But Matt had several many week-long summer Treks in his background, and it was decided to give him a chance. To say he held his own and succeeded would be an understatement. Philmont Trail Crew soon learned that Matt had arrived and he and they would never be the same.

Always active in Section Leadership, 1997 found Matt serving as Vice-Chief in Section W-3B. While he could have carried the day and concurrently served a 2nd term as Lodge Chief, he felt it best to let others step-up and he would concentrate on Section Leadership. When he lost narrowly in the election for Chief in 1998, Matt was asked to again return to his Lodge and step-up to serve second term as Lodge Chief of Orca Lodge.

In 1999 Matt was Section Vice-Chief once again. This was a rather unique year, as Section W-3B created the model and paved the way for what was to become the National Program, ArrowCorps5 that took place in 2008. As it was the last year of the century the Section wanted to do something special and unique. A Conclave in Yosemite National Park was the goal. Matt learned of a conservation program whereby scouts could spend the weekend in the park in return for a conservation project. Matt was instrumental in arranging a meeting to discuss this proposal. The Park Service limited the program to 500 Arrowmen, but the conclave that year met and exceeded everything the Park Service asked of them. Truly one of the greatest Conclaves ever, and Matt Dukeman played a key role in making it happen!

It was not a surprise at all that the youth recognized his accomplishment and elected him Section Chief in 2000. His next task? To jointly lead Area 3 in a tri-clave of all three sections. Bringing together 3 Sections proved to be quite a task, but resulted in another huge success with over 500 Arrowmen in attendance at Two Rock Coast Guard Base.

Beginning in 1999, Matt went to work at Philmont. First as Trail Crew Foreman and eventually as Director of the OA Trail Crew. Matt now had left his legacy in his Chapter, his Lodge, his Section and ultimately, a National program, OA Trail Crew.

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## STEVE FINI – FOR YOUTH SERVICE TO MOW-A-TOC LODGE



Steve lived just blocks away from the Redwood Area Council office. It was only natural that his playground became the Scout Office, where he seemingly ran the place. Yes, as a youth, an Eagle Scout and Lodge Chief, Steve truly did run the Lodge and more, while serving multiple years as Lodge Chief! The only surprise was he did not take the next step and become a Scouting professional.

He was integral in organizing the lodge in everything from Lodge meetings, Camporees, Ordeals, Ceremonies, to making sure the Summer Camp was staffed and always to be a part of Section W-3B Conclaves. Steve had been instrumental in not only landing (back then a lodge bid and was selected to host a conclave) the last Area 12C Conclave held at College of the Redwoods to being a key player in the new W-3B conclaves thereafter.

Not only did Steve excel at leading events in his lodge and council, but at section level he truly blossomed on a larger stage. He always made sure that his lodge was not just a participant in section politics, but a leader. Steve saw to it that no matter how distant the conclave, Mow-A-Toc lodge always had a large contingent present.

At the 1975 conclave held in Coalinga, CA, just an 8-10 hour drive away, Steve was elected Section Vice Chief. Part of the platform was to get the conclave back to a Scout Camp. The resulting theme of "Back to the Stix in '76" and location at Camp Bristol Hood was due in no small part to his efforts. The conclave itself was a huge success with outstanding attendance.

1977 saw Steve out of Section office, but not as a player in the section or keeping things humming along in his lodge. He actively recruited other youth to assume leadership of his lodge, as well as volunteered leadership of many events. Steve roared back in 1978 as Section Chief with a cabinet of officers he promoted for election perhaps more than his own campaign. He had learned "surround yourself with good people and good things were bound to happen". Conclave was once again a huge success.

Turning 21 in 1979 Steve could no longer run for youth leadership positions...but that didn't really slow him down. He went on to serve a long tenure in the 1980's as Lodge Adviser, while serving on the Council Executive Board and continued to serve in various capacities in the Section into the 2000's. Truly Steve learned his lesson as a Servant Leader during his youth and it carried into his adult life to this day. He is still sought out for advice and counsel regarding the OA and Scouting by his peers. To this day, Scouters speak in reverence of the Steve Fini era of Mow-A-Toc Lodge as the Golden Years, perhaps the zenith of Scouting on the North Coast of California.

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## VIOLA "KITTY" HARRIMAN – FOR ADULT SERVICE TO MOW-A-TOC LODGE



Kitty Harriman. Wow! What can we say? To my knowledge, the first women in the Order of the Arrow. Perhaps her living on the remote California North Coast made it possible. I don't think if she had resided in a metropolitan area her presence would have been tolerated long before someone outed her as a woman in Scouting and the Order of the Arrow during the 60s-70s.

As a full blood member of the Tolowa Tribe...she was something special. When her son became a Cub Scout, she of course registered as a Den Mother. Nothing different about that. But then, at some point Mow-A-Toc lodge's Dance team happened to cross her path at a Scouting event. Well, dance just happened to be something she knew about, from the Native American side of the fence. She couldn't let those scouts just Dance...she had to get in there and show them how to really dance. Her

love of dance was infectious and the Dance Team flourished with Kitty becoming an Explorer Post leader as well as Lodge Dance Adviser and Lodge Ceremonies Adviser. Everyone wanted to be a member of this team. She taught them about Native American culture, dances, bead work and costume making. While they were dancing their legs off throughout the Redwood Area Council, it was at Area 12C Conclaves held throughout Northern California and Nevada that she was first noticed by those outside of the Lodge.

The Northcoast of California was a far flung corner of the Area (and later Section) with most trips involved travel of generally 8-12 hours, by School Bus. Getting the Dance Team and the Lodge in general to Conclave was no small feat. But Kitty organized the travel, and of course, the bus was driven by her husband (who was also a Scouter). When the Lodge arrived, usually late Friday night, the conclave could truly begin. Mow-A-Toc was truly a vital part of Conclaves. And everyone flocked to the Dance Competition to see what Mow-A-Toc had come up with that year. Truly dance was elevated and flourished under her guidance and leadership.

During this time, she was an integral part of the lodge. Serving not only as Dance Team adviser, but also as Ceremonies Team Adviser. It was only natural that youth arranged for her to become an Ordeal member and it was with obvious enthusiasm she received the Brotherhood honor just a few years later. In the mid-seventies Kitty was selected by the lodge to receive the Vigil Honor. It would be 15 more years or so before the National program would recognize women as members in the Order.

On the scouting side, in addition to serving as a den mother all those years ago, and later as a Post Adviser, Kitty held the position of Assistant District Commissioner for over 35 years. Truly she changed and enhanced Scouting on the North Coast of California for the better.

Jason was inducted into the Order in 1990 at the end of the OA 75th anniversary year. As a youth in Montana, he served in various chapter, lodge and section positions. In this time he worked toward greater unity of Apoxky Aio, which still was experiencing merger pains 20 years after the fact.

In the fall of 1998, he became a member of Orca Lodge, and has been active ever since. His support of Orca has helped to make the lodge more effective in its service to the units and districts of the Redwood Empire Council. His commitment to the OA was highlighted by his Wood Badge ticket, with many of his ticket items geared toward supporting his Lodge.

Jason has served as an Associate Lodge Adviser for 3 different Lodge Advisers, working on ceremonies development, and enhancing the administrative functions of the Lodge. In addition to his lodge roles, he serves the national OA program, having staffed 5 NOAC's, 1 Jamboree, ArrowCorps5, and SummitCorps.

Locally Jason supports the Section W-3N OA programs, having served as a Conclave site Coordinator in 2005, and working actively in OA High Adventure promotions at Conclaves since. He is also responsible for the development and execution of a unique Section Conclave scuba program. The untested nature of this program meant great effort on Jason's part. However the success of his program has seen itself repeated at 2 more Conclaves, and he has been asked to serve as Scuba Coordinator for the 2012 and 2015 NOACs.

In 2012, our Lodge went through reorganization, with 1/3 of the membership being reallocated to Crater Lake Council. Suddenly, Orca had to revise our youth leadership. This required balancing Lodge continuity, with the development of our officers. Jason worked closely with our Lodge Adviser and Staff Adviser to help these new officers run the Lodge. While during our first year after the realignment, we did not meet JTE recognition, Jason worked with our officers, & Orca lodge was able to achieve JTE Gold status in 2013.

In November 2013, Jason took on the position of Lodge Adviser and has since served as a sterling example to our program. In this role, he has worked to expand the visibility of the Lodge in both Council and District programs. This visibility is allowing the OA to explore units that have been without our presence for many years. Jason's guidance, has not only promoted positive growth of membership and program features underneath our 2014 LEC, but also lead us to once again achieve JTE Gold status for the year of 2014.

Jason's service to the Order in Areas W-5 and W-3; his leadership of both Orca and Apoxky Aio Lodges; and of course the execution of national scouting events has expanded our program through the last century and will continue to drive it into the next.

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## RAYMOND LEONARD – FOR YOUTH SERVICE TO CABROSHA LODGE



From the time Ray first became a member of Cabrosha Lodge it seemed he was destined for greatness. Serving 2 terms, 1980 and 1981 as Lodge Chief, then 2 terms in 1982 and 1983 as W-3B Section Chief and ultimately playing a major role as CVC of Special Events at the National Order of the Arrow Conference at Rutgers in 1983, Ray has been there and done that.

Beginning with Ray's ordeal in June of 1976 he was active. He served two years as Miwok Clan Chief and during this time was instrumental in developing an Arrow of Light Bridging Ceremony which spread from his Clan to the entire Lodge. During this same time he served as youth representative to Miwok District for both Camping and Training. He further served as youth Chair for Cub Scout Day Camp. It's a wonder he didn't stay there in service of his little brothers in blue and call it good.

Ray was in the first wave of the new staff CIT program at Camp Masonite Navarro which would culminate in 11 years of continuous staff service. In 1984, while still a youth he was named Program Director and in 86-89 he served as Camp Director. Ray was very active from the beginning in the Section leadership attending his first conclave in 1977. He served as CVC of Trading Post and Activities when his lodge was Service lodge for the 1979 Conclave held at Camp Masonite Navarro.

As Lodge Chief in 1981, Ray helped Section W-3B move from the traditional "Lodge Hosted" Section Conclave to the "Service Lodge" conclave with members of Cabrosha lodge serving as some of the first Section Conclave Vice Chiefs. His support of the "Service Lodge" concept has been carried over from his time as youth to adult with the time he served as Associate W-3B Adviser leading to Section W-3B Adviser.

Ray always seemed to do things in 2's, so it was no surprise that he also served two terms as W-3B Section Chief elected in both 1982 and 1983. He led conclaves held in sites as divergent as the Humboldt County Fair Grounds in Ferndale and Travis Air Force Base in Fairfield. Ray further cemented his legacy in Area 3 serving as NLS coordinator for 3 years. Another 1st for Ray was being awarded an E. Urner Goodman Scholarship and subsequently becoming a professional Scouter. For all of this, Ray was recognized as the first and only member of Cabrosha Lodge to receive the Distinguished Service Award, and that he earned it in 1986 for his youth service speaks volumes.

It goes without saying that Ray Leonard remained very active as an adult who became the first Adviser of Orca Lodge, formed when Cabrosha and Mow-A-Toc were merged. Under his guidance Orca emerged as a leader in the Section and remains there to this day. Truly Scouting and Order would not be the same without the inspiration and leadership supplied by Ray Leonard...a Centurion of the highest order!



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## BRUCE MAYFIELD – FOR ADULT SERVICE TO ORCA LODGE



Bruce Mayfield has been involved in the Order of the Arrow in Northern California for decades, but has been especially instrumental in combining the Cabrosha Lodge and the Mow-A-Toc Lodge. Bruce has provided important leadership to help overcome barriers which often arise during mergers.

He has provided important adult adviser leadership to many young men, and proved to be a great Lodge Adviser and Section Adviser. He has been actively involved in helping to ensure that a quality program has been offered in the Orca Lodge for the last 20 years. He is always there and can always be counted on.

Bruce is a perfect example of the high ideals and purpose of the Order of the Arrow. He is a true servant leader and always has the best interest of the youth in mind. He always helps unite two separated groups to come to a common ground.

Over the years, Bruce has helped to build Orca Lodge, and encouraged many others to become involved at the Section and National levels. Bruce has served on staff at many NOACs, NLS, and NLATS (too many to list). In his role at the Region, Bruce has helped to bring the concerns of small Lodges to the attention of the Region, and I think that smaller Lodges feel more connected to the Section/Region and National programs than they have in the past.

Bruce was instrumental in helping give leadership to unique National level programs. ArrowCorps5 in 2008 at Shasta-Trinity. This program provided great service to the National Forrest, and the Pacific Crest Trail. These trails improvements will be seen for decades to come. In 2011, Bruce again helped give leadership to the SummitCorps program near the Summit Bechtel Reserve in West Virginia. This helped lay the groundwork for great community involvement in the National Jamboree just two years later.

In his roles at the Section and National levels, he has influenced many Arrowmen who have gone on to various Region and National officer positions, and one who has gone on to become the next National Director of the Order of the Arrow.



Marty has always been a presence. Some might say a clanging bell or dare I say, a quacking duck (inside joke there), but Scouting would not be same without him and all that noise only served to draw more youth to Scouting and the Order of the Arrow.

When Marty first became a member of Cabrosha Lodge #537 back in 1964, who could have known he would rise to such great heights. Scouting was growing at this time and Marty right along with it. Cabrosha Lodge was less the 5 years old at this point and had already assumed a key role as a major component of Camp Navarro operations. The lodge held 2 ordeals a year, one to setup camp which leads directly into the regular summer camp season and another to close camp in the fall after long term camp was over. It was quite an honor to be allowed into Camp in those times and Marty was quick to cease upon this and parlay it into a Staff position in summer camp.

Marty was a part of the group that led a successful bid to land the first Area 12C conclave in 1967 for Cabrosha Lodge. Serving as Lodge Chief in 1967, the conclave was held in the City Park of Ukiah, CA. Many innovations were used to pull this one off, including sending the participants to local restaurants for meals....wonder how that would work in today's world?

In the meantime Marty was moving up the ladder in staff positions, and spreading the word of the Order in the Sonoma Mendocino Area Council. Working first on the Waterfront and later as Program Director Marty inspired countless youth to aspire to be more like him. He earned his Eagle Rank in 1967 and was to receive the Vigil Honor in 1969.

In 1967 Marty served as a leader of the World Jamboree contingent for the Council to Farragut State, ID. Perhaps Marty's greatest adventure was a trip to the 1971 National Order of the Arrow Conference with the Lodge Adviser and other Camp Navarro Staff members. It was the first ever for a member of Cabrosha Lodge and featured a cross country car camping adventure. Marty truly pioneered what was to become a standard. Cabrosha, and then Orca have not missed a year of attendance at a NOAC since.



### 2016 OA SERVICE GRANT

A MakerLab is a place where the general public can come, learn, develop, and create with tools that they do not have ready access to them in their home, school, or workspace. With this in mind, we would like to add MakerLab to your tool box of community outreach, publicity, and revenue generation.

Most MakerLabs use the projects that are available in the *Make:* and *Craft: Magazines* to help teach people skills such as wiring, programming, general tool safety, and many other topics. These would be in line with the Scouting movement, and could be arranged to help support the merit badge program that you already offer.

Examples of Merit Badges that could be enhanced are: Programming, Digital Technologies, Home Repairs, Electricity, Robotics, Inventing, etc. Many MakerLabs also bring in subject matter experts to lead classes to build the communities involvement with the "Maker Movement".

People tend to use these labs because they have tools and materials that they may not have at home, such as a 3D printer, CNC machine (computer controlled milling and etching), Electronics testing equipment, Quilting/Sewing Machines, and many more. Some of this equipment can cost upwards of several thousand dollars.

For the average consumer, they will not be able to purchase these, even if they save for months and years. Since the BSA's mission is to prepare the youth of our nation, MakerLab is a way for them to learn to work with these technologies. Otherwise, they may not be exposed to until they go to College or beyond.

MakerLab is in line with the Scouting movement as a way to instill in youth and adults... the proper use of tools and technologies. The operating of the MakerLab can become a magnet to increase membership in the Council, as well as spread the high ideals of Scouting.

The Lodge would like to contribute to this project by purchasing, or contributing to the purchase of a 3D printer or similar product. This will help in the mission of the MakerLab and the Scouting movement by improving the abilities of the space and bringing more people that would be interested in these kinds of projects.

While the MakerLab will be an ongoing operation for the Council, the Lodge's financial will be completed before October 31<sup>st</sup>, 2016, but the Lodge may continue to supply more volunteers for the operation of this MakerLab in the future as well.

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## 2016 INNOVATION AWARD

Annually, two chapters and/or lodges in each region that have effectively developed and successfully implemented creative and innovative solutions to challenges faced in carrying out their annual program plans will be recognized with the national Order of the Arrow Innovation Award. To be considered for this award chapters and/or lodges must provide the information requested below and submit this completed petition with the lodge charter renewal application by December 31, 2015. Limit your total response to one to four pages.

**1. Achieve Order of the Arrow Journey to Excellence Bronze, Silver or Gold level recognition. Summarize your 2015 JTE results including areas you accomplished and areas to improve upon.**

Achieved JTE Silver in 2015. With the new requirements for JTE in 2015, we worked on getting into more units. This is still an area that needs work. We are working on plans to access more units for Elections, and for camp promotions (including LNT).

**2. Describe the challenge or opportunity you identified. What was the issue you faced?**

BSA expanded the Outdoors Ethics program and asked Councils to provide increased emphasis in this area as too many scout units were not practicing sound environmental stewardship. Orca Lodge recognized that one of the purposes of the Order of the Arrow was to: ***“Promote camping, responsible outdoor adventure, and environmental stewardship as essential components of every Scout’s experience, in the unit, year-round, and in summer camp.”*** In addition, one of the primary elements of the Messengers of Peace program is: ***“Relationships between humankind and its environment”***. Orca Lodge decided to become Messengers of peace by providing Outdoor Ethics Awareness to the units of the redwood Empire Council.

**3. Describe the idea your chapter or lodge implemented to address the challenge or opportunity you identified. What did you do? Who was involved? When and where did this occur? What were the costs?**

Orca Lodge conducted both a leave No Trace and a Tread Lightly Trainer course for its members. The courses usually cost \$50.00 a person to cover materials, campsite, and administration fees. These costs were donated saving the Lodge over \$500.00. Once the Lodge members were trained they signed up for all of the scheduled Council activities that included; Cub Scout Twilight camp, Webelos Woods, District Camporee, Scout University, Advance Camp, Hornaday weekend. Orca Lodge volunteered to conduct the Outdoor Ethics training at the Order of the Arrow Section Conclave. In addition, they members went to a number of individual Pack and Troop meetings.



**4. What success did your chapter or lodge have with this idea? What was the result? Cite statistics and numbers where applicable. How has this new idea benefited the Order of the Arrow or Scouting?**

22 members of Orca Lodge conducted over 200 hours of service attending these functions. It is estimated that over 2000 scouts and their leaders were trained or at least exposed to the Outdoor Ethics principles. By conducting the training, and setting the example, most of the Council activities have demonstrated environmental stewardship. The Outdoor Ethics training is usually conducted in and around a Tipi surrounded by OA themed props. Scouts come to experience the excitement of the surroundings of the Order of the Arrow and learn Outdoor Ethics as a side benefit; and gain an appreciation for both. The food waste has been reduced. There is an increase in the use of reusable or recyclable materials for council activities. The program camp fires have been minimized to a respectful level. At a recent Ordeal ceremony the campfire burned to complete ash just at the completion of the program (just like it is supposed to do).



**5. What will happen in the future? How do you plan to continue and / or to grow this idea? Explain how the idea will be sustained over time.**

The Council office refers all calls for Outdoor Ethics training to Orca Lodge. Orca Lodge has set the example for other Lodges at the Section Conclave. The lodge is planning for annual Leave No Trace and Tread Lightly Trainer courses to maintain the qualifications and add new trainers. The council has asked Orca Lodge to include the Hornaday Conservation Awards in its awareness programs. The Lodge Chief and Advisor attended the neighboring council Hornaday weekend to assist and establish expertise in this area.

**6. Describe how your idea furthers the mission and purpose of the Order of the Arrow, its members, or the Scouting program in your council.**

Orca Lodge has demonstrated Environmental stewardship in its actions and by the members taking these practices back with them to their individual troop units. There has been increased interest by a number of individual units in the Council programs and activities in order to attend and gain knowledge in Outdoor Ethics awareness provided by the Lodge. One Troop traveled some distance to attend one of the presentations provided by the local Chapter and has expressed renewed interest in having OA elections. The council has a large geographic region and OA is bringing continuity to these separated units.
